## Section 1 - Open Classes

ALL LIVESTOCK EXHIBITORS **MUST BE RESIDENTS OF NORTHAMPTON OR MONROE COUNTIES** on FIRST COME, FIRST SERVE BASIS and all ANIMALS MUST BE PRE-REGISTERED.

- Exhibitors will be expected to display or parade their animals as directed by the Superintendent; to accept the stall assigned without controversy; to keep their animals in an attractive appearance, and to cooperate with the Department in every way that may serve to increase the educational value of the show.
- Exhibitors of livestock must inform themselves as to when their stock will be judged. Stock must be in the ring promptly on call and a failure to comply with the order renders exhibitors liable to be ruled out of competing.
- Decorations with ribbons or ornaments previously won by animals at shows shall be prohibited until after the awards have been made in their respective classes by the judges.
- Exhibitors must have all animals listed for competition on the grounds not later than 9:00 PM, Tuesday. All such animals shall remain on the premises until 10:00 PM, Saturday, unless released by the Superintendent.
- The exhibitors will be expected to keep the space they occupy in a clean and sanitary condition and to remove all their equipment promptly as the Superintendent may direct.

# DEPARTMENT 3: OPEN BEEF CATTLE

ALL LIVESTOCK EXHIBITORS **MUST BE RESIDENTS OF NORTHAMPTON OR MONROE COUNTIES** ON FIRST COME, FIRST SERVE BASIS, and all animals must be pre-registered.

1. All animals must have an official ear tag or official legible breed registration tattoo.
2. No beef cattle showing signs of contagious or infectious disease, including active ringworm, warts, lice and mange, will be admitted to any show.
3. Official Health Certificate (AAI-13 or equivalent) must accompany all beef cattle for show or sale. A health chart is valid for the entire show season beginning April 1 and ending with the Pennsylvania Farm Show.
4. Interstate animals exhibited at Pennsylvania shows or fairs must meet Pennsylvania requirements and must be accompanied by an Interstate Health Certificate to be eligible for entry.
5. Vaccination Requirement: All cattle must be accompanied by a health certificate, signed by an accredited veterinarian, that includes a statement the animal(s) identified have been immunized against BR, PI3 and BVD. Animals that have never been vaccinated against BVD or have not been vaccinated against BVD during the previous 12 months must receive one dose of modified live virus vaccine given at least 15 days and not more than 180 days before the show or two doses of killed vaccine, two to four weeks apart, with the last dose given at least 15 days and not more than 180 days before the show. Animals that have been vaccinated against BVD within the previous 12 months must receive at least a single injection of modified live virus or killed vaccine given not less than 15 days and not more than 180 days before the show. Hyper immune serum may not be used as a substitute for the above vaccination requirement. No animals will be admitted to the show or fair unless these requirements have been met.
6. Health and registration papers will be checked upon arrival.
7. Rabies immunization is strongly suggested.
8. Vet must add the statement indicating that herd has been examined and found free of infectious or contagious disease.
9. All animals must be entered in proper class(es) or no premium awarded.
10. When on exhibition on the fairgrounds and in the show ring, animals must be under halter and owner or owner's representative must be responsible for animal.

# DEPARTMENT 4: SHEEP

Pre-Register by July 1st

## Section 1 - Breeding Sheep

ALL LIVESTOCKS EXHIBITORS **MUST BE RESIDENTS OF NORTHAMPTON OR MONROE COUNTIES** ON FIRST COME, FIRST SERVE BASIS, and all animals must be pre-registered.

### Health Rules For Sheep (only 4 pens per farm)

1. No sheep showing clinical signs of contagious, infectious or external parasitic disease including foot rot and sore mouth will be admitted to any show.
2. All show sheep must be individually identified by an ear tag or tattoo and this identification must be listed on the health certificate.
3. The flock of origin, including sheep consigned to a show shall be examined by an accredited veterinarian. The veterinarian must prepare the official health certificate (AAI-13) and must state on the health certificate that he examined the entire flock and found no evidence of contagious, infectious, or external parasitic disease. The date of examination must also appear on the health certificate within 90 days of show.
4. Certification by the owner and accredited veterinarian that the identified animal(s) are (or are not) known to have been exposed to scrapie. ALL SHEEP EXCEPT WETHERS MUST BEAR AN OFFICIAL U.S.D.A./A.R./H.I.S. EAR TAG TO BE EXHIBITED AT THE SHOW. SHEEP FROM FLOCKS ON THE VOLUNTARY SCRAPIE PROGRAM MUST BEAR THE Official EAR TAG, TATTOO OR ELECTRONIC EAR IMPLANT
5. IMPORTANT RULE – Certification by the owner and an accredited veterinarian that the identified animal(s) is (are not) known to have been exposed to scrapie.
6. Pen of lambs consists of two ram lambs and two ewe lambs.
7. Flock consists of one ram, any age; two ewes, one year and under two years; two ewes under one year.
8. Breeder's young flock consists of one ram lamb and two ewe lambs, all bred and owned by exhibitor.
9. A Get of Sire shall consist of four breeding animals, any age, or sex the get of one sire. Get need not be owned by the exhibitor.

## Health Rules for Swine

1. No swine showing clinical signs of contagious or infectious disease will be admitted to show.
2. All show swine must be individually identified by either ear tag, ear notch, or tattoo.

An official health certificate (AA1-1S), signed by an accredited veterinarian must all swine. It must state that the animal(s) show no signs of contagious or infectious. The certificate must be used within 30 days of the opening date of the show and list all animals.

No Pseudorabies test required.

No Brucellosis test required.

**HEALTH CERTIFICATE:** A certificate of health prepared by an accredited veterinarian shall be forwarded to the bureau of Animal Industry, Harrisburg, Pennsylvania 17110, not less than five days prior to the opening date of the fair. A duplicate of the certificate, and a copy of the brucellosis test report shall accompany the animal to the fair.

# DEPARTMENT 10: 4-H AND VOCATIONAL CONTESTS

*A 4-H member can begin 4-H at age 8 and continue through age 19.  
An FFA member begins FFA at age 14 and continues through age 21.*

## Section A-22:

### **What's the Real Purpose of Youth (4-H & FFA) Livestock Projects?**

One purpose is to teach young people how to feed, fit, and show their animals. The more important purpose is to provide an opportunity for personal growth and development of the young person. The Josephson Institute of Ethics has developed a curriculum, which identifies six core values which may help to better describe the value of youth livestock projects. This curriculum also presents the idea that people develop and strengthen character by practicing certain behaviors just as muscles are built through exercise. Therefore, the purpose of the youth livestock program (4-H and FFA) is to provide opportunities for young people to develop character. The character traits identified and some practices (exercises) that may build character follow:

**Trustworthiness** - includes honesty, promise keeping and loyalty.

- daily feeding, watering of animals (promise keeping)
- adheres to possession deadlines (honesty)
- adheres to withdrawal times on drugs and dewormer
- only the appropriate use of approved drugs

**Respect** - includes courtesy and proper treatment of people and things.

- proper handling of animals, treat humanely
- proper care of animals
- listens to and follows advice of advisors
- recognizes that animal projects are dependent on 4-H'er and provides daily feed and water

**Responsibility** - includes the pursuit of excellence, accountability and perseverance.

- daily feeding and watering (even on busy, difficult days)
- goes beyond providing the daily needs of the animal in giving additional time and attention to produce a winner
- adheres to deadlines for entry forms and for arrival at livestock shows
- never gives up in the show ring (perseverance)

**Fairness** - involves consistently applying rules and standards appropriately for different age groups and ability levels

- feed only approved livestock rations
- only the appropriate use of approved drugs
- accepts winning or losing with grace
- conduct in the show ring follows recommended procedure
- fitting and grooming of animals follows recommended procedures

**Caring** - promoting the well being of people and things in a young person's world. It denotes action and not just feelings.

- daily feeding and watering
- provides clean barn/stall for animal
- treats animal humanely at all times

**Citizenship** - includes making the home community and county a better place to live for themselves and others

- accepting instructions
- winning and losing with grace
- helping others at stock shows
- teaching young members
- treating animals humanely
- ensuring that your meat animal is safe for consumption

  - d. Protect from dirt, disease, infection, and mechanical damage. Select specimens that are perfect and show no blemishes of any kind.
  - e. Condition and maturity. Be sure that exhibits are of high quality
  - f. Potatoes should not be washed. Remove soil using soft cloth or brush.
  - g. Tomatoes should have stems removed. Carrots, beets, etc. should have tops (leaves) removed from vegetables leaving about (2) inches of stems.
3. Read premium material, carefully following all rules and regulation if an entry calls for five specimens, be sure to exhibit that number; do not enter four or six. In any instance your exhibits will be disqualified if the correct number of specimens is not entered.
